

WERO Researchers Have Been Busy

In May (Haratua), Dr. Waitoki embarked on a journey to the UK alongside members of the New Zealand Psychologist's Board, a regulatory authority in psychology, and the College of Clinical Psychologists. This collective of Māori psychologists was fueled by a strong determination to confront the emerging trend of global standardisation in psychology undergraduate and graduate programs. They voiced their concerns and challenged the leaders of psychological societies to fulfill their declared obligations of dismantling monoculturalism within the field of psychology. Dr. Waitoki, during this excursion, delivered three talks on the critical theme of decolonising psychology. This endeavor remains a persistent and integral aspect of the Institutional Racism project centered on the decolonisation of psychology.

Dr. Waitoki also delivered an invited keynote address to the Japanese Psychological Association's annual conference during Te Wiki o te Reo Māori. Her talk described the imperative of disrupting the prevalent centering of whiteness in apologies to Indigenous peoples. In her presentation, she emphasized that psychology must not merely 'include' Indigenous perspectives but must also encompass the complete decentering of whiteness and the dismantling of the deeply ingrained racist structures within the field. She also gave an invited talk at Ritsumei University, Osaka on decolonising psychology, and Indigenous language revitalisation.



The September panel comprised distinguished figures including Dr. Waikaremoana Waitoki from the New Zealand Psychological Society, AProf Hanako Suzuki representing the Japan Psychological Association as a board member, Dr. American Thema Bryant, President of the Psychological Society, Dr. Nikki Hayes, President of the British Psychological Society, and AProf Nattasuda Taephant from Thailand.

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We would also like to extend our heartfelt congratulations to Dr. Kyle Tan, who has been honored with the prestigious GV Goddard Early Career Award for his remarkable contributions to the field of psychology. This recognition was awarded during the NZ Psychological Society AGM, which took place in Wellington on September 14th. We also congratulate PhD candidate Joanna Chan for her outstanding achievement in being awarded the NZ Psychological Society's Social Justice Scholarship, which was presented to her at the same AGM in September.

HAKA (MIS)APPROPRIATION DISCUSSED

Research Fellow Hemopereki Simon presented a paper at the Global Mormon Studies Conference 2023, which was held online. This paper has also been accepted for publication in the Journal Culture & Religion. The topic of Hemopereki's presentation was the cultural (mis) appropriation of haka by Mormon missionaries and its memorialisation on YouTube. This is part of Hemopereki's ongoing series of research that seeks to engage the Church in intercultural dialogue and hopefully address issues of racism against Indigenous People from the Pacfic and North America. "Key to achieving this in the academic arena is introducing the important ideas from critical Indigenous studies to Mormon studies." Hemopereki said.

2023 CARN CONFERENCE IN ŌTAUTAHI

Dr Kyle Tan presented at the Cross Agency Rainbow Network (CARN) conference at Christchurch in June. Alongside the Counting Ourselves: Trans and Non-binary Health Survey research team, Kyle spoke about the need to protect the health and wellbeing of minoritised groups during a time when disinformation is surging. Kyle drew on findings from the Kia Whakapapa Pounamu Survey with programme directors of psychology training, to highlight the urgency of expanding culturally responsive training to work with rainbow and takatāpui communities, across all health professional programmes.

MATIKA HAWAIKI: NATIONAL SPEAKING TOUR

A national speaking tour was held in July for Matika Hawaiki, a kaupapa that aims to connect local struggles in Aotearoa to the regional movement for a nuclear free and independent Pacific. Seven events were held across three cities. Guest speakers included stalwarts who were active in the 1980s, such as Hilda Halkyard-Harawira, Hone Harawira, Nicky Hager, Maire Leadbeater, David Robie, Suzanne Menzies-Culling, and Marie Laufiso. These movement elders were put in conversation with contemporary organisers and scholars including Sina Brown-Davis, Hineitimoana Greensill, Teanau Tuiono, Marco de Jong, Arama Rata, Tāwhana Chadwick, Nate Rew and Gabriella Brayne.

The events included a wananga at Auckland Museum for history teachers, and an event that commemorated the sinking of the Rainbow Warrior and also launched a petition to oppose the AUKUS military pact.

Arama outlined how joining AUKUS would be a betrayal of the Pacific, as it goes against our commitments as a member of the Pacific Islands Forum to Pacific-led foreign policy to finding peaceful solutions to global tensions, and to prioritising climate change as the biggest security risk in the region.
